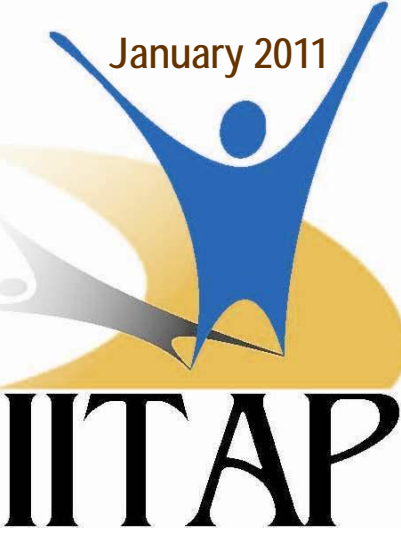

CSAT Spotlight - Mari Lee, MA

1. Tell us a little about yourself – where you live, family, education, hobbies, etc.

I am a native Californian, born in Santa Monica in the 60's to Irish Traveler parents, and then placed in foster care at 2 years old. I was adopted by a brilliant, but ultimately broken couple in their 40's when I was 7. Soon after my adoption, we moved to a small farming community in Oregon for 5 years [population 800], where my adoptive mother's red velvet cocktail dresses, sequin shoes, champagne cocktails, and holiday teas went over like a lead balloon with the local townsfolk.

Needless to say, it was not a good fit.

In the 9 years that I lived with this couple, I learned a great deal about co-dependency, rage, trauma, drama, abuse, love addiction, sex addiction, secrecy, and ultimately...about forgiveness. An education I had not bargained for, but one that impacted every area of my life. After less than a decade, and a PhD in resiliency and risk taking, I took my \$700 dollars of saved babysitting money – a veritable gold mine in those days - left home at 16, and moved to Maui. The idea of volcanoes and palm trees felt just about right after those years in a rigid family in chilly Dundee, Or.

Eventually, island bliss was less than blissful, and so at 17 I moved to Los Angeles with my surfer boyfriend and was accepted into the prestigious, "Al Tate's School of Beauty and Cosmetology." Not exactly the university that my well educated adopted parents had hoped for, but as I was no longer in touch with Glenn and Mary Lou, and had outgrown babysitting gigs, I was eager to begin my career as a stylist. 10 months and \$300 later, at 18 years old I was officially a hair and make up artist for the studios. It was 1980 and Nancy Reagan's, "Just Say No" slogan was not in the vernacular of *my* social circle; a social circle which included a blue Mohawk, and lots of adventures with some interesting famous and infamous folks on the LA scene. A few years later, I outgrew the Mohawk and the surfer boyfriend, and moved to Orange County during a stint in the early 90's where I thought I would make a great attorney..mainly because I was dating one. I pursued law school and the like, but ultimately a career in law was not in the cards for me..and thankfully neither was the attorney boyfriend.

I have called Glendora my home for the last 20 years. It is a quaint artist community tucked into the California foothills, about 30 minutes outside of downtown Los Angeles. My friends on the west side all cautioned me about moving 'to the



sticks' and were quite astounded at this social butterfly flitting off the scene in my late 20's to buy a 100 year old fixer upper far away from the hub and the bub of the city. But I liked [and still do] the idea of being able to ride my pink beach cruiser up to the farmers market, or over to the village coffee, and not have to contend with the So Cal traffic, meters,

mayhem, and \$7 bottled designer water. Don't get me wrong – I still love a night out on the town, but I enjoy the peacefulness of living in Glendora. I also have a place in Kona that I visit a couple of times a year and enjoy hanging out there with friends for some island R&R that includes paddle boarding, hiking, body surfing, kayaking and just general sloth like behavior.

My adoptive father passed away a couple of years ago; he was a math professor, and first generation from Norway; a genius but certainly not the warmest guy you would ever want to meet. My beloved dog 'Jack' of 11 years passed away last year – a big old sweet heart of a pal, and I now reside with two silly, but ever

so snuggly rescue cats, Pie and Stan who keep me company in my little 1907 Craftsman style home.

My hobbies include hiking, flamenco dance, travel, writing, yoga, and entertaining or meeting up with friends all over the US and other areas. I love zipping here and there in my little convertible to see friends for adventures and fun. And I feel blessed and fortunate that my extended family includes a very diverse group of individuals whom I adore and feel adored by. People often share that my dinner parties are quite eclectic...and I like to keep it that way!

2. Tell us about your path to becoming a therapist. What obstacles have you had to overcome?

Well, besides the Adams family meets Harry Potter like obstacles briefly touched on above, I think my biggest obstacle was myself, my confidence level, and as hard as it may be for those who know me nowadays to believe: my sense of shyness. God and my journey were always moving me toward this work, and yet, I resisted it for a very long time. For a risk taker, this was something of a conundrum for me. Each time the field of psychology rose up to meet me, I gently curtsied, and then did a quick two step in the other direction. Through I eventually attended college, I did not start grad school and my MFT program until I was 40. It was quite a journey as I had to overcome the fear of shutting down a successful interior design business, and figure out a way of paying for school without student loans – something I did not want to have to deal with at the end of my academic process. Needless to say, it was a few years of eating oatmeal, apples and peanut butter and not a lot of new shoes for this girl. I could not have done it without the help of my sister who split the cost of every semester with me 50/50.

Other "obstacles" [or what I like to call opportunities] along the way have included those folks who have greatly underestimated my brain, or stereotyped me, or dealing with the occasional ego tripper that we all run across on occasion in our field. I have learned to steer clear of the "Envious Irma's", "The Fearful Fred's", and the "Negative Nellies", and prefer to cultivate professional relationships with other like minded, focused, and compassionate clinicians.

Beyond my faith and my friends, other supporters along my journey were my great supervisors, and amazing CSAT colleagues [shout out to Ninoska, Bill, Ginger, Aaron, Alex, Ken, Dr C, Tami, Stuart, Tony, Young, Sam, MJ, Brig, Bryan, Chris, Kristine, Vicki, and so many others] and one in particular, the fabulous Cindy Powers, my CSAT supervisor. With few exceptions, the CSAT process has been incredibly enriching and powerful, and the friendships and colleagues I

enriching and powerful, and the friendships and colleagues I have met along the way have been true blessings.

3. Do you believe that there is still a stigma surrounding sex addiction?

Yes, I see it every time someone asks what I do. The stigma doesn't concern me, it challenges me...and I like a good challenge! I also like the idea of being an advocate for this work, stigma or not. I am passionate about what I do, am well educated in this discipline, and confident in the clinical work I provide, and have a great deal of compassion for my clients and belief in their recovery - they are the real hero's as far as I am concerned. Every time I present or speak, I discuss this stigma and each time I hear from at least half a dozen people from the audience who tell me that they have a much better idea of what sex addiction is and what it isn't - that is extremely gratifying to me.

4. Tell us about your practice - types of clients you see, tools you utilize, what is working for your clients.

I have a large private practice that I incorporated this year, "Growth Counseling Service, Inc." located in Pasadena, CA. About 80% of my practice is working with male and female sex and love addicts, the other 20% is a variety of presenting issues. In addition to individual and couples work, I facilitate three weekly recovery groups, "SRS [Sexual Recovery Support] group for men, HEART [Heal, Encourage, Accept, Restore, Trust] for the female partner, and HOPE [Helping Ourselves Progress and Expand] for women who have 'graduated' out of HEART. As a recovering love addict I enjoy this work immensely and find it enriching and fulfilling. The tools I use are divided between FTS workbook, exercises I have created around communication, early years wounds, attachment, and trauma, various other books that are the gold standards in our CSAT work, DVD's, art and music therapy. I am quite busy with a month out wait list, so every 5th week I take that time off to cultivate self care and 'Mari' time. This 5th week has become part of my self-care practice for the last two years.

5. What are your future goals for your practice?

I would like to begin mini IOP's every quarter and am working on a system for rolling this out. Additionally, I am learning a new software system for going paperless and will implement that in 2011. EMDR training is in my future as well. And, I am growing out of my current space, and will need to consider moving my practice next year as well. My dynamic colleague, Ninoska Ramirez, LMFT, and CSAT in training, and I are looking around for a space locally. Additionally, I have a book in the works that I need to finish up on attachment, sex and love addiction, and one on self care...just can't seem to find the mojo to finish these books up. And I am about half way through a workbook for the

so snuggly partner that is feeling really cohesive and solid. So, lots going on. Looks like I need to get out to Kona and spend some peaceful and focused time wrapping up these writing projects. Finally, I hope to challenge myself and begin presenting at conferences around the US and abroad.

6. Are you interested in research/new findings, etc., about sex addiction?

Interested and always seeking new information and findings, doing my own research studies, and love dialoging with other clinicians especially in the area of neuro chemistry. My clients call me the 'brain nerd', and in my perfect little brain nerd universe, I would like there to be an accessible data base of current information with brain imaging for CSAT's to access. C'mon Dr. Amen!

7. What do you see for the future in sex addiction therapy?

Hope.

8. Are you active in your community? Tell me about it.

I have been doing more and more speaking and presenting, often on Sex and Love Addiction, but also on relationship and women's issues. My two most popular workshops are: "Will I ever get through to you? Learning to Speak Pink, Learning to Speak Blue" for couples, and "From Fairy Tales to Face-lifts: Learning to Love the Image in the Mirror." I am also part of a peer support group in LA that includes a variety of really solid therapists from many different specializations.

9. What are some things about you that the CSAT community doesn't know?

My previous professional background included many years in corporate America in advertising, marketing and fund raising. I also owned and operated a successful design firm for 10 years which was fun and honed my business skills. I believe the reason for success in my practice is a combination of business experience, excellent and on going training, hard work, focus, organization, prayer and self care, relationship building, passion in my specialization, generosity of spirit toward assisting peers, and being able to deliver a sound system of recovery for clients who are struggling in the area of Sex and Love Addiction. I can advertise and promote myself all day long, I can charge a fee that feels good for me and allows me to make a great living [which I have done from the very start], but the bottom line for me is being a good therapist that clients trust and respect [and refer to!]. As therapists we provide an invaluable service and my belief is that we should be compensated an excellent fee

for this service. My philosophy is charge a fee that works for you and allows you to make a great income, and then be worthy of that fee. We can make a great living in this work. Believe it!

The token provides an opportunity to use the test, personally, without using a client token, but also provides research for the test as a comparison group with the general public. The tests are anonymous and individual test results are provided only upon your request.
