Dr. Daniel J. Siegel will Keynote the 6th Annual IITAP Symposium!

From Patrick Carnes:

As many of you know, we use Dr. Dan Siegel's *The Nine Domains on Integration* as one of the fundamental constructs of the task-centered approach. The good news is that he, Dr. Dan Siegel, will be joining us to support our effort and to talk about his research. We will also have a free-wheeling conversation about the role of trauma and what trauma supports around specific performables. Plus we have new data from the SDI and PTSI on what trauma does or how trauma affects specific sexual behaviors. We will also talk about how to use the SDI-R and PTSI-R together. All of which makes for another exciting time at the annual IITAP Symposium.

About Dr. Siegel:

Daniel J. Siegel received his medical degree from Harvard University and completed his post-



graduate medical education at UCLA with training in pediatrics and child, adolescent and adult psychiatry. He served as a National Institute of Mental Health Research Fellow at UCLA, studying family interactions with

an emphasis on how attachment experiences

influence emotions, behavior, autobiographical memory and narrative.

Dr. Siegel is currently a clinical professor of psychiatry at the UCLA School of Medicine where he is also on the faculty of the [Center for Culture, Brain, and Development](#) and the Co-Director of the Mindful Awareness Research Center at UCLA. An award-winning educator, he is a Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and recipient of several other honorary fellowships. Dr. Siegel is also the Executive Director of the [Mind-sight Institute](#), an educational organization that focuses on how the development of mindsight in individuals, families and communities can be enhanced by examining the interface of human relationships and basic biological processes. His psychotherapy practice includes children, adolescents, adults, couples, and families.

Dr. Siegel has published extensively for the professional audience. He is the co-editor of a handbook of psychiatry and the author of numerous articles, chapters, and the internationally acclaimed text, [The Developing Mind: Toward a Neurobiology of Interpersonal Experience](#) (Guilford, 1999). This book introduces the idea of interpersonal neurobiology and has been of interest to and utilized by a number of organizations, including the U.S. Department of Justice, The Vatican's Pontifical Council for the Family, Microsoft and Google, early intervention programs and a range of clinical and research departments worldwide. 

CSAT Spotlight Cara Tripodi, MSS, LCSW, CSAT



Tell us a little about yourself – where you live, family, education, hobbies, etc.

My name is Cara Tripodi and I am a licensed clinical social worker and reside outside of Philadelphia, PA. I am married and have a 12-year-old step-son. I earned my Master in Social Service from Bryn Mawr

College in 1991 and have worked in the addictions field since that time. I am the Owner of STAR- Sexual Trauma & Recovery, Inc. an outpatient treatment center for the treatment of sexual addiction and related disorders. I am also a CSAT-S. Hobbies are reading—just finished *Freedom* by Jonathan Franzen, which was excellent, as well as puzzles, pets and being in the outdoors and. Friends and getting together with family and travel are also important.

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Tell us about your path to becoming a therapist. What obstacles have you had to overcome?

Since a young age I always wanted to work with people in need. I was raised in a family that valued service to others and I was especially inspired by the work of Mother Theresa and her dedication and sacrifice to the poor. I always knew I would give service to those in need. I chose social work because it was important to have a broad understanding of the social and environmental influences that shape people and communities and the role of family in forming an individual's character.

When I entered graduate school, I had just returned from working with the Navajo Indians for a year in New Mexico, which furthered my awareness of cultural diversity and racism. Becoming a therapist and focusing my interest in sexual addiction, I had to confront where I most wanted to be career wise. I was working simultaneously in medical social work for the first eight years while honing my skills in sexual addiction. At some point I had to decide which direction I wanted my career to go and take certain risks financially and professionally to make that happen. Believing in myself and following my passion was an instrumental step in shaping myself clinically and professionally. That focus allowed me to mold, more definitively, my commitment to the work of those struggling with sexually addicted behaviors and specifically to the programmatic care for this special population.

Another obstacle was becoming a business owner without having any business experience. Seeking business advice and thinking more like a business person challenged me to learn to wear two hats—clinician and business owner. Believing in the work I had done and the conviction that more was needed to help this population inspired me to launch my career further.

A more specific obstacle has been broadening the sexual addiction communities understanding of the needs of partners of sex addicts. I learned early on that there was little information about the process partners go through following discovery of the addicts addiction. Learning from partners as well as the work I did in medical crisis social work allowed me to better understand and then help heal partners pain that although similar to addicts is also very unique to them. Becoming a voice for partner's particular needs has been a great challenge as well as an opportunity in advancing awareness in the sex addiction community.

Do you believe that there is still a stigma surrounding sex addiction?

I most certainly feel there is a stigma surrounding sexual addiction. However, having been in the field now for close to 20 years I have seen such advances in more public recognition that a problem exists. I feel compelled and drawn to helping reduce stigma relate to the problem of sexual addiction because I see so many struggle with the behaviors and many more impacted by those afflicted with this disease.

Tell us about your practice – types of clients you see, tools you utilize, what is working for your clients.

I work with both partners and sex addicts alike. I draw upon the tools gleaned from years of addiction work to include the Task Model as well as other treatment modalities like EMDR, somatic experiencing, family systems models and psychodynamic models. Many tools are essential in working with clients long-term as the crisis abates and other trauma and attachment related issues emerge in treatment! STAR uses both Facing the Shadow and Recovery Start kit and has a specific RS group, which follow a 10-week psycho-educational group called "Beginnings."

One of the tools I developed at STAR is something I have coined "strategy session." These are sessions where both parties come together with their mutual therapists to address specific issues. This is often indicated when couples are not quite ready to enter couples therapy as well as find traditional therapy too unsafe for them. More specifically it is done in a structured fashion to address timely issues often related to separation, disclosure, communication, goals and themes related to children or treatment plans. It is especially helpful in bridging the divide that can often form between couples within the first year of discovery/disclosure and can be the first place a partner can practice having a voice in a relationship which has been so damaged by addiction, secrets lies and betrayal.

What are your future goals for your practice?

To continue to advance programmatic care in the Philadelphia region and provide educational and supervisory resources for therapists interested in expanding their knowledge on sexual addiction. I also am committed to writing about partners and women's sex addicts and am collaborating on two books geared to these topics. Both partners and therapists need tools to help advance the healing and treatment.

His professional book, [The Mindful Brain: Reflection and Attunement in the Cultivation of Well-Being](#) (Norton, 2007), explores the nature of mindful awareness as a process that harnesses the social circuitry of the brain as it promotes mental, physical, and relational health. His book [Mindsight: The New Science of Personal Transformation](#) offers the general reader an in-depth exploration of the power of the mind to integrate the brain and promote well-being. His latest professional text, [The Mindful Therapist](#), explores the application of these ideas for the clinician's own development of mindsight and neural integration.

Dr. Siegel's ability to make complicated concepts exciting as well as easy to understand has led him to be invited to address local, national and international organizations where he speaks to groups of educators, parents, public administrators, health-care providers, policy-makers, clergy, and neuroscientists. He lives in southern California with his family.

Are you treating clients of both sexes? If so, does the treatment differ between the sexes?

Yes. Treatment needs can vary depending on sex. Females tend to be initially more relational and open to developing a rapport with a therapist but often are not as committed to following a structured treatment program without sensing that it feels right or appropriate for them (i.e. timing). Males, on the other hand, can be more receptive to direction and despite some initial reticence to entering a treatment program can more readily embrace a structured format of care. STAR is currently treating more males than females but that is starting to change as more female addicts are becoming more commonly diagnosed.

Are you interested in research/new findings, etc., about sex addiction?

Absolutely! A recent article by Kafka (2009) has been so instrumental in understanding where the broader field of is going in terms of the language of what to call this disorder. I, in particular, find that brain research is fascinating and is another useful way to help clients understand their problem while reducing their shame. I am a strong believer that in order to help clients to heal you have to aid them empower them through education as to what this problem is.

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What do you see for the future in sex addiction therapy?

I see the CSAT community growing. I am thrilled that we have a structured body like CSAT since it lends credibility to the field and invites more universal recognition of the treatment of sex addiction to clinicians' interested in entering the field. CSAT brings uniformity to treatment, which I believe is essential with this population, because without it is easy to get lost in how to best help a client to heal. I see that there will continue to be debate in the broader mental health community as to what to call this problem. However, I don't see that as deterrence and in fact see that we CSATs can offer a particular structured model that will help many struggling with this addiction. I see more tools are needed in helping addicts with relapse and see more advances in the field geared to this area.

Are you active in your community? Tell us about it.

I am active in Pennsylvania Society for clinical social workers also am very committed to giving of my time to SASH and IITAP and have chosen to devote more time and resources to advancing the needs of the field on a more global level. I also offer pro-bono services through consultation with clinicians in the area regarding clients they are working with as well as speaking engagements to broaden my local communities understanding of sexual addiction.

What are some things about you that the CSAT community doesn't know.

The Staff at Leadem Counseling & Consulting Services, PC has completed the final draft on a course for training CSATs and other licensed professionals to successfully provide intervention services in a private practice setting. The course, while not exclusively designed for the sex- and love-addicted population, has unique features that make it especially well-suited for working with these populations and is specifically designed to be used by licensed clinicians.

The intervention model designed by John Leadem in the 1980's, *Raising the Bottoms*, is a unique blend of traditional Johnson Intervention wisdom and a series of task oriented strategies that provide the interventionist with a clear framework for raising the bottoms of the intervention team members, the addict, and the treatment process. The model takes the interventionist well beyond the traditional notion that the main objective is to get the addict into treatment and holds that a successful intervention gets everyone who needs help treatment and that the treatment matches the identified needs.

The model addresses the therapeutic needs of the concerned others in a way that greatly reduces the addict's resistance to getting help and promotes a shared model of recovery rather than the "addict as the identified patient model," which can be shaming and often backfires. *Raising the Bottoms* is especially suited for the licensed therapist because it draws on your professional practice wisdom to formulate a comprehensive understanding of the needs of the significant others as well as the therapeutic obstacles that will have to be addressed to ensure a successful intervention and productive treatment experience. In addition to enhancing the repertoire of resources available to your clients, the addition to your skill set can greatly enhance your community outreach and provide additional revenue streams often lost by outsourcing intervention requests.

IITAP is working with John V. Leadem, LCSW, CSAT-Supervisor and Elaine M. Leadem, LCSW, CSAT, to bring this training to you in the summer of 2011 in the form of either a continuing education course or a certification course. 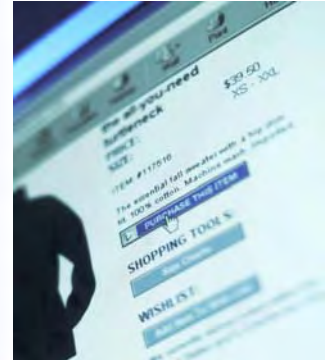
